

Many thanks to our friend Frances Schultz who secured the privet club venue for us. Close to home, a new neighbor down the street, Deborah Buck, had the wonderful idea of introducing live model drawing sessions at Madoo—no more need to go into town for the Art Students League! And a little later in the season Eric Dever will start up his Saturday morning painting classes on April 18.

At the Parrish Art Museum, March 15 to April 26, 2015 in Water Mill, NY is opening a show of Robert Dash's Sagg Main series of paintings on canvas and paper. The paintings, on loan from the Madoo Conservancy, record Dash's memories of the nearby street in all sorts of conditions as Alicia Longwell, the Lewis B. and Dorothy Cullman Chief Curator writes, "In a final series of ten paintings and as many works on paper, Dash amplified a single image of neighboring Sagg Main Street to create a nuanced exploration of color and light."

We are delighted to welcome Belgiumbased landscape architect Peter Wirtz, CEO of Wirtz International, who will be speaking about the importance of horticultural knowledge in garden design. His day-to-day connection with plants and soil is a key source of inspiration and knowledge. According to Madison Cox's much-lauded book The Gardener's Garden, "Wirtz's use of clipped hedges to define spaces and focus views recalls great landscape designers such as André LeNôtre. It has become widely recognized as his trademark and is made more contemporary by being combined with perfectly proportioned mown lawns, reflective pools, gravel paths and borders full of massed

plantings. Wirtz gardens [...] work as well in winter months as they do in summer."

Along with his brother, Martin,
Peter Wirtz joined his father's firm
in 1990. Since then the three have
continued to create some of the most
sublime private, public and corporate
gardens throughout Europe, the
United States, Israel and Japan.


MARCH 29 Stephen Orr
